

HOMEWORK RESEARCH INFORMATION - topic of discussion at next parent / head chat.. The following research was carried out by the Education Endowment Foundation - who carry out all the government research so that improvements can be made to education.

Homework (Primary)

Homework refers to tasks given to pupils by their teachers to be completed outside of usual lessons. Common homework activities in primary schools tend to be reading or practising spelling and number facts, but may also include more extended activities to develop inquiry skills or more directed and focused work such as revision for tests.

How effective is it?

It is certainly the case that schools whose pupils do homework tend to be more successful. However it is less clear that the homework is the reason why they are successful. A number of reviews and Meta-analyses have explored this issue. There is stronger evidence that it is helpful at secondary level, but there is much less evidence of benefit at primary level.

There is some evidence that when homework is used as a short and focused intervention it can be effective in improving students' attainment, but this is limited for primary age pupils. Overall the general benefits are likely to be modest if homework is more routinely set. The quality of the task set appears to be more important than the quantity of work required from the pupil.

How secure is the evidence?

Homework has been extensively researched. There is a relatively consistent picture that pupils in schools which give more homework perform better, although for primary age pupils the difference is small. However, there are only a small number of studies which have investigated whether this relationship is due to the homework itself, rather than other school factors. These studies compare classes where homework is introduced to similar classes where homework is not given. They tend to show that homework can be beneficial, but this finding is less secure than the first.

What should schools consider?

Overall, homework in primary schools does not appear to lead to large increases in learning.

Effective homework is associated with greater parental involvement and support. How will you design homework to encourage parental engagement?

The broader evidence base suggests that short focused tasks or activities which relate directly to what is being taught, and which are built upon in school, are likely to be more effective than regular daily homework.

Have you made the purpose of homework clear to children?

In discussion with teachers and feedback from parents on a regular basis we are going to go back to basics with homework and concentrate purely on the areas that form the basis of a good education - reading daily, spelling and time tables or number facts.

We will aim for teachers to produce simple activities or games that can be used by parents and children and hopefully take the 'arguments' that sometimes occur between parents and children when trying to 'get them to do their homework'. On the class blogs there will be ideas from staff and parents who want to do more will be able to look at the topics and plan additional activities or visits to supplement the work in school. I would welcome parental views on this research and our idea of going back to basics at the parent head chat - thank you.
