Purple Pens of Progress

Marking and feedback is an important part of ensuring that children make good progress in their learning. Previously I have written about (and you will have seen in books) 'success and improvement marking' which involves using growing green and tickled pink pens to highlight two or three areas that the children have made good progress against the objective for the work and one area in which they could have done even better. Teachers then use a constructive comment to help the children improve against the identified area. A final stage in the marking is that children are given time to actually improve their work according to the comment. When we looked through books recently we found that, at times, it was difficult to distinguish the children's corrections/ improvements and so we have introduced 'Purple Pens of Progress'! From now on, every time children respond to teachers' comments after they have completed success and improvement marking, they will respond in purple so it is really easy to see.

Emergency Closure

It is getting to that time of year where the colder weather hits and the forecasts are filled with the threat of snow! We try our hardest to stay open during difficult weather but occasionally have to make the decision to close. We close the school if: we were unable to get the school to heat sufficiently; there is no running water or we do not have enough teachers to keep the school open. I am really keen that all the children read as often as possible at home as it is proven to have a very positive impact on their reading outcomes and, in turn, how confident they are with their learning in all other areas of the curriculum. Please can I ask that you really push this at home and remember to write in the reading diaries.

Absence Letters

As you know, the government is very strict with schools insofar as targets for attendance and they state that all children should have attendance of at least 95%. In line with our policy on attendance, we regularly check children's attendance figures and monitor those children who are less than 95%. During next week we will be sending out letters to those parents whose children have fallen below 95%. If you receive a letter and would like any help or support please come in and see me.

Lunch Payments

At the moment we have quite a number of parents who owe significant amounts of money for school lunches. Please could I ask that all parents check how much they owe and pay any outstanding bills by Friday 19th December. Ultimately the meals do have to be paid for and so if parents do not pay what they owe, the school has to pay and that means that we have less money available for the education of all pupils.



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
